INTERNATIONAL AND LOCAL COOPERATION

UKRAINIAN MARITIME FORUM IN LONDON



On June 14, 2024, the Ukrainian Maritime Forum was held in London. It was organized by the Marine Transport Workers' Trade Union of Ukraine with the support of the International Transport Workers' Federation (ITF) and the State Service for Maritime, Inland Waterway Transport and Shipping of Ukraine.

The event brought together about one hundred participants from the global maritime industry, including officials from the ITF, the International Maritime Organization (IMO), the International Labour Organization (ILO), and representatives from leading shipowners, maritime educational institutions, seafarers' unions, and charitable organizations.

The main topic was "Ukrainian Seafarers – your professional partners for safe navigation".

Arsenio Dominguez, IMO Secretary-General, and Gilbert F. Houngbo, ILO Director-General, strongly supported Ukrainian seafarers and emphasized the importance of international solidarity and unity in these challenging times.







"I continue to be inspired by the dedication and resilience of seafarers. Their work is crucial for the global economy, and we must continue to promote their rights and well-being," Arsenio Dominguez said.

And in return, Gilbert F. Hongbo called for international solidarity and support for Ukraine, emphasizing the importance of unity in these difficult times, and expressed deep concern for workers and communities affected by the ongoing conflict.

Stephen Cotton, ITF General Secretary, highlighted the bravery and contributions of Ukrainian seafarers, calling for continued support and recognition:

"This Forum has provided an important discussion on how we can protect our industry and secure Ukraine's future after this terrible conflict. Our support goes out to all our friends in Ukraine, who have shown incredible bravery. The contribution of Ukrainian seafarers deserves our respect and recognition".

Oleg Grygoriuk, MTWTU Chairman, thanked international partners for their unwavering support, emphasizing its importance for the stability and sustainability of Ukraine's maritime sector. He expressed deep gratitude for every gesture of solidarity, believing that continued support would achieve greater success:

SIGNIFICANT MEMORANDUM SIGNED AT UKRAINIAN MARITIME FORUM

During the Ukrainian Maritime Forum, the Marine Transport Workers' Trade Union of Ukraine and the State Service for Maritime, Inland Waterway Transport and Shipping of Ukraine signed a Memorandum of Cooperation.

This agreement aims to protect the labor and social rights of Ukrainian maritime workers and develop opportunities for acquiring professional competencies in line with international conventions.

The Memorandum also focuses on assisting Ukrainian seafarers in crises, ensuring their rights, safety, and professional growth.

MTWTU MEETS WITH SEAFARERS IN ROMANIA

As part of a joint project between the Marine Transport Workers' Trade Union of Ukraine and the ITF Seafarers' Trust, MTWTU organized the first meeting with Ukrainian seafarers in Romania. MTWTU initiated this project to support seafarers wherever they are, and we are grateful for the support received.

The event covered the trade union's work during the war, support for those stranded in Ukraine, and those forced to leave the country. Union experts provided legal consultations and answered common questions about employment, employment contracts, and life on board ships.



Special attention was given to mental health issues, which are particularly relevant for Ukrainians today. We will continue to expand our support and provide necessary assistance to all Ukrainian seafarers, regardless of their location.

YOUTH-ORIENTED ACTIVITIES

OPEN DOORS' DAY AT THE MARITIME UNION CENTER

On June 8, the Maritime Union Center hosted an Open Doors' Day for the Kherson State Maritime Academy. Prospective students learned about the joint program with the Lithuanian Maritime Academy, thanks to which, 50 cadets have continued their studies abroad and earned bachelor's degrees. This year, ten more sponsored spots were provided. This project, for children from vulnerable social groups, military families, and active conflict zones, will continue next year due to the cadets' high performance.

On June 3, cadets from the Kherson State Maritime Academy, studying under the dual degree program at the Lithuanian Maritime Academy, participated in an environmental campaign at the Curonian Spit.

This event highlighted the importance of ecological awareness and the active involvement of youth in protecting the environment.
